School Life Engagement

Grades 9 & 10

Grade 9 (troisième) is the final year of middle school (collège) that formally concludes with Le Diplôme National du Brevet des Collèges (DNB) that is awarded following a series of culminating national examinations that students sit.

In Grade 10 (seconde), the transitional year that precedes the Baccalauréat, student develop their autonomy and explore their interests before choosing their specialization.

Students in Grades 9 and 10 take a common core of courses and have the option to further extend their studies to include additional courses (language, Latin, cinema studies or fine arts). Students also have the option to further enhance their courses taught in English by selecting the American International Section.

The Baccalauréat: Grades 11 & 12

Grades 11 (première) and 12 (terminale) are the final years of the French curriculum. Together they determine the Baccalauréat final mark. Mandatory courses include common core subjects as well as the specialties chosen by the student (three specialties in Grade 11 to two in Grade 12) that will provide rigorous discipline-specific preparation for university level studies.

Students continue to have the option to take on additional electives to supplement their learning experience. The American International Section is also an elective open to all students interested in deepening their understanding of Literature, History and Geography.

Grading

Academic achievement in the French system is graded on a 0 to 20 points scale.

Students are assessed according to the skills needed to demonstrate proficiency in their specific disciplines. Written examinations call for essay responses and problem solving and rarely on multiple choice answers.

The academic year is divided into three terms. A grade is assigned at the end of each term and the


average grade across all three terms determines the overall achievement for that year. The Lycée Français de Toronto neither calculates nor publishes class rankings.



Academic Qualifications for Post-Secondary Studies

The Baccalauréat is the diploma that LFT students obtain after completing secondary school education and serves as the students' academic qualification for post-secondary studies. A student's achievement on the Baccalauréat is determined by a mix of national final examinations, exams given over the course of Grades 11 and 12, and students' annual averages. Final exams, both written and oral, are evaluated by official examiners. One of the hallmarks of the Baccalauréat is Le Grand Oral, an oral defense of an inquiry research project related to one or both of their Grade 12 specialty courses.

Many universities across the world recognize the Baccalauréat as an advanced secondary school curriculum. Students applying with Baccalauréat credentials secure admissions to even the most selective universities and university programs and many universities grant students up to a full year of advanced standing.
